

Anthi Revithiadou, currently Professor of Linguistics (with specialization in Phonology and Morphophonology) at A.U.Th., received her Ph.D. from Leiden University/HIL in 1999 (Ph.D. thesis: *Headmost Accent Wins*). She earned her BA in Greek Philology with a major in Linguistics (1999). From 2001 to 2009, she served as a Faculty Member at the Department of Mediterranean Studies,

University of the Aegean. She also held a position as a Lecturer at the Department of Modern Foreign Languages and Literatures, Boston University (September 2000 – August 2001). Between November 1998 and August 1999, she was a Postdoc Researcher at the Department of Linguistics, University of Massachusetts, Amherst with a TALENT–stipendium financed by the Dutch Organization for Scientific Research (NWO).

Revithiadou's research interests encompass phonological theory (metrical and prosodic phonology), the morphosyntax-phonology interface, language typology and language contact. She has also a profound interest in contact-induced systems and, especially, endangered varieties of Greek that have been in long-term contact with Turkish (e.g., Asia Minor Greek, Ofitika Pontic, etc.).

Her academic contributions are extensive, including 5 books, 7 edited volumes, 21 journal articles, 52 articles in edited volumes and proceedings, and 16 encyclopedia entries.

Revithiadou conducted fieldwork trips in Nea Trapezounta on Ofitika Pontic (2003, 2006, 2009) and in Symi on Symi Greek (2002, 2006, 2007). She received the *Studies 2009/ Mελέτες 2009* research grant (Project: *Ofitika Pontic: A Documentation Project with Special Emphasis on the Diachrony and Synchrony of the Dialect*, Funding ID 2128) by the John S. Latsis Public Benefit Foundation and the *Fulbright Research Grant* (2008) in order to carry our research on Ancient Greek stress at MIT.

Revithiadou presented her work at universities in Europe and the USA, contributing to scholarly discourse. From September 2010 to November 2014 she led Action 5: *Reinforcement of the Mother Tongue* in the program *Education of Immigrant and Repatriate Students* (A.U.Th.; Funding IDs: 85705, 86040, 86041). In 2014, she received *The European Language Label 2013* by the State Scholarships Foundation for developing, together with the team of Action 5, *The 7 Keys of the Dragon*, an interactive open source extensible software for the teaching Albanian and Russian to students with the respective languages as their heritage language.

Her conference contributions exceed 100 internationally, and she organized events such as the Annual Meeting of the Department of Linguistics in 2022 and 2024, OCP 4 and the Mediterranean Syntax Meeting (2005). She served as the Secretary of the Complexity

Center at A.U.Th. since 2017 and she has been a Member of the Board of Trustees for the Institute of the Modern Greek Studies – M. Triantafyllidis Foundation since 2022.

In addition to her academic service, Revithiadou has been an active reviewer for journals, conferences, workshops, and research projects. Her dedication extends to supervisory roles for postdoctoral fellows, Ph.D. theses, and master's theses, exemplifying her commitment to mentoring the next generation of scholars.

From January 2024 to December 2025, she serves as the Principal Investigator of the research project titled "Gradience | Modeling the limits of grammar: Integrating lexical frequency in a Gradient Harmonic model of lexical stress; Evidence from young and adult Greek speakers' grammars, which is being implemented within the framework H.F.R.I call "Basic research Financing (Horizontal support of all Sciences)" under the National Recovery and Resilience Plan "Greece 2.0" funded by the European Union – NextGenerationEU (H.F.R.I. Project Number: 15053; ELKE / A.U.Th. Special Account for Research Funds Number: 76809).
